

ORANGE TAXI HISTORY

Orange Radio Taxi Cabs celebrates its 70th anniversary on 15 July, Bob Curran, owner operator from 7 July1993 to 9 October 2024, with great help from ODHS researcher Tony Bouffler, relates the history of taxi cabs in Orange.: Hansom cab waiting at the Exchange Hotel, corner of Anson & Summer streets below. The first motorised taxi to operate in Orange was owned by Mr McInnes in 1911 and bookings were made with Miss Blake of Byng Street next to the School of Arts. This 1911 vehicle, probably a French made Renault, didn't ply its trade in Orange for long and a newspaper article described how it was destroyed by fire in 1912, on Coffee Hill (Cargo Road). After World War I, motorised taxis slowly became more popular, but for some time the hansom cab and motorised taxis were seen together in the streets of Orange in the 1920s, but by 1930 the car had replaced the horse completely.

The first permanent rank was established in Lords Place in 1927 as part of the beautification of Lords Place, between Summer and Byng streets (now known as the bottom rank) beside Robertson Park. A metal phone box was erected with the telephone number of 700. Later in the same year the council did the same set-up in Anson Street near Summer Street.

The phone number was listed in the *Leader* paper as 'seven oh oh'. This phone box had a loud bell; it was necessary for a driver to hear the call in a taxi with the windows wound up on a cold winter's night. This noise caused many problems over the years for guests at the Royal Hotel. Around 1980, new owners of the hotel paid to install a large orange light on top of the box that flashed when a customer called.

In the mid-1920s Gold Top Taxis spread from Sydney through to regional towns offering discounted taxi fares. In Orange they were controlled by Mr and Mrs R Michel who operated nine taxis from a shed near the top rank, and competed against Orange Taxis, which were individually owned and operated mostly from the bottom rank. This influx of nine taxis increased the total in Orange to 24. Almost all these vehicles would have been American or English branded vehicles, assembled in Australia. At first there was no special number plate for taxis and in fact the only way you could tell a taxi until after WWII was if it had 'For hire' on the side doors, but this was up to the owner and not compulsory. Also vehicle colour was a choice still made by the owner.



Between the wars most people still could not afford a motor car and taxis quickly became popular to hire for weddings see photo above, reaching a peak in the 50s and 60s but this income source slowly reduced and the last wedding that used taxis was about 2004. It was charged out at \$200 per taxi and two cabs were used.

During WWII petrol was severely rationed to just a few gallons a week and to survive taxi owners took drastic steps. One reporter wrote of the sight of taxi drivers pushing cars up on the bottom rank one by one, to save fuel. Some owners went to the expense of putting a charcoal burner in a trailer to convert coke or charcoal to producer gas to run the cab and towed it behind the vehicles. Others bolted charcoal burners to the rear of their cars to maintain an income, as can be seen in the photo This vehicle had a charcoal burner creating the gas to power the engine.

After World War II, returned soldiers were encouraged to apply for taxi licenses and at least two were granted in Orange, increasing the number to 28. Next, the State Government started issuing special taxi licence plates T-xxxx in Sydney metropolitan area and TC-xxxx. Originally these plates were a dark blue with white numbering, then in 1994 they were recalled and yellow and black ones issued. These only lasted briefly before they too were recalled, being replaced with the lighter blue and white ones we see today.

As councils had some say in the issuing of plates, many reports in the newspapers of that time wrote that different aldermen said the town needed more taxi plates, adding that people were waiting for hours for a taxi on the ranks and one alderman said he had seen 70 people waiting for taxis at the railway station so he convinced council to apply for five more taxi plates.

The Department of Transport in Sydney didn't agree and issued only two extras.

Finally, in 1955, after numerous complaints to the council of taxi drivers overcharging customers, who till now had been using the system of zoning which had been introduced by council in the mid-1940s, the State Government made it compulsory for all Orange taxis to install meters. As this was a big exercise they were given time to buy them and have them installed, which were an expensive addition to the running costs of the local operators. With the new meters came an illuminated 'TAXI' roof sign with an orange dome light that went off when the taxi was hired.

By 1955 there were 30 taxi plates in Orange, but it was said that from 1945 to 1965 was the best time for the income of the taxi driver in Orange as there were fewer buses and owners of private cars.

For many years Orange railway station created considerable business for taxis, as it was a major junction for people coming from west of Parkes and Broken Hill, Wellington and Dubbo so the taxis often transferred people to hotels and later motels for an overnight stay. They also transferred railway men to their homes or occasionally to different towns.
