Sunbeam's North American Works Rapiers

Rootes Competition Department built two Sunbeam Rapiers which raced with some success in the US in the 1960s. Perhaps one had survived?

A recent Sunbeam Car Owners Club of South Australia magazine included an interesting reprint of a 1994 article on these cars (not that I am biased).

Rootes cars had made a successful foray into endur- The field comprised a Volvo, two Minis, an Austin beam Rapiers came first and second in their class in increasingly by private entrants for production car racing, and Rootes Competition Manager Norman Garrad decided that a successful factory-supported program was better than privateers racing its cars unsuccessfully.

Two Series III rally cars were prepared for the International Production Touring Car Race at Silverstone in July 1960. Peter Harper in one car set the fastest lap in the under-1,600cc class and Paddy Hopkirk in the other was first in the 1,000-1,600cc class. Coincidentally at the same time the head of Rootes' US operations asked Rootes Competition Department to support a racing program in the US to see if involvement in production car racing would sell more cars there.

ance racing in 1956, when two Works-prepared Sun- A40, a Morris Minor, a Renault Dauphine, a Ford Falcon and three Volkswagens, with factory entries of the Mille Miglia. By 1960 the Rapier was being used the two Rapiers and two 3.8 litre Jaguars. Rootes' US management wanted the Rapiers to make a good impression, so flew Peter Harper and Paddy Hopkirk over to drive them.

> The Jaguars followed by the Rapiers left the rest far behind, the only real excitement occurring when Hopkirk lost his left rear wheel. Harper's Rapier eventually finished third behind the two Jaguars.

FIA regulations at the time stipulated that at least 1,000 identical cars must have been built and every part catalogued and available for sale. However only two of the Rapiers were built, though in theory parts were available to build the other 998.

The two competition cars, with aluminium boot and Rootes Competition Department prepared two new bonnet panels, Perspex windows, lightweight racing seats and stripped of all interior comforts were so unrecent production car racing experience. Stock Rapiers had 1,494cc four cylinder engines which developed 78bhp at 5,400rpm. However the competition cars' engines were modified to at least Rootes Stage Two tune with 100bhp at 6,000rpm. Even when fitted with 4.44:1 rear axles without overdrive they were capable of over 100mph.

Chassis modifications, FIA-compliant or otherwise, included stiffer damper settings, uprated springs and front anti-roll bar.

In January 1961 the Rapiers were flown to Mexico City for Pedro and Ricardo Rodriguez to drive in the Carrera Ciudad de Mexico.

The Rapiers started the race on the front row of the grid and soon left the rest of the field for dead. Ricardo won 15 seconds ahead of Pedro and set the fastest The restored Sunbeam Rapier now wears number one, lap at 69.8mph.

The last event of the Rapiers' US racing career was in 1962, when the car driven by Peter Harper and Ricardo Rodriguez was raced by Dick Nash and Gene Hobbs in a 12-hour endurance event organized by the Sports Car Club of America. The Marlboro circuit in Maryland, a 1.7-mile track with 11 corners and no proper pit facilities, was considered one of the most demanding circuits in the US.

Other entrants included four Volvo PV544s, two Pontiac Tempests, a factory-supported Buick V6 Special, two Monza Corvairs, a Chrysler Valiant, a Panhard, an Alfa Romeo Giulietta and a host of Fiats, VWs, Saabs and Simcas. At the finish the Rapier was third behind two of the Volvos.

Shortly after the Marlboro race the Rapiers were put up for sale. In April 1962 the Harper/Rodriguez car passed through four owners before finally being repatriated to the UK in 1990.

The other Rapier, which was still owned by Rootes Motors Inc in April 1962, has disappeared, despite all efforts to find it.

The surviving car arrived in England in the summer of 1990. It spent considerable time in the body repair shop but then languished for two years. However the restoration was eventually resumed, and after thirty years the last surviving lightweight Sunbeam Rapier race car was finally up and running.

In August 1993 the car passed its first-ever MoT test and was therefore fit to be operated on the road. A superb example of a 1960s production racing saloon had been rescued!

South African Valiant Rustler VH

This road test from a 1973 South African motor magazine describes the Valiant Rustler ute, a model name not used in Australia. The Rustler used panels sourced from Australia but was fitted with US slant six engines and either US-made TorqueFlite auto transmissions or locally-made manuals.

Chrysler South Africa is having a vintage new-model year with the "fastbody" VH Valiant models and their derivatives, one of which is the stylish and capable new Rustler utility.



speed TorqueFlite automatic transmission and 108kW discs are the same as on the sedans. with the three-speed manual.

Mechanically the two models are equivalent to the Regal Formula "S" Automatic and Rebel manual respectively. Both models have an agreeable standard of equipment, with a spacious three-seater bench seat which is not too bouncy and a good amount of head and leg room. The seat backrest tips forward to reveal storage space behind, and a tray under the rear load space houses the spare wheel, and would take a modest amount of luggage.

The instrument panel contains the full range of Valiant instruments including temperature and oil gauges, unit of the Regal. This speedometer, incidentally, is totally accurate in the cruising range, but underreads slightly at the top end.

Gearshift and selector lever are both on the column, and steering is low-geared for lightness. Heater/ demister with two-speed blower is standard, as well as With bigger tyres and more inertial mass the Rustler the new Valiant ventilation inlet system. The floor covering is a durable moulded rubber mat which is easy to keep clean.

We were surprised to find that the Rustler is 87kg heavier than the Regal sedan, but soon found the reason: underneath that smoothly-styled unitary coachwork is a beefy ladder-style chassis and a suspension to delight the man who wants a real load vehicle.

At front a heavy-duty version of the Valiant independent torsion-bar suspension is used, and at rear is a clever dual-rate leaf-spring system. The first cluster of four blades gives a firm but reasonably smooth ride when light, and the second-stage cluster of three blades (including a short, rigid "donkey blade") gives 753kg load capacity. The suspension is tailored for heavy-duty capacity beyond doubt, and the two-stage tailgate will drop vertically if required.



There is plenty of power and torque on tap from the high-performance, long-stroke six which shows up in gradient ability and further enhances its loadability.



Fuel economy, similarly, is slightly down on the Regal's figures, but only by one or two mpg. Based on a requirement of about 15 litres per 100km at cruising speeds and taking into account the big 84-litre tank the Rustler has an operating range of about 550km This ute can be handled with considerable enthusiasm, light, dropping to 400-450km loaded.

The bigger tyres impose more load on the brakes, which caused a degree of fade in a test series of 10 crash stops, but the Rustler remained steady and controllable at all times. If pushed too hard the front wheels would occasionally lock at low speeds. Braking times as a whole are indifferent because of the mass and the middling adhesion of cross-ply tyres.

The ventilation inlet capacity is copious if rather draughty, and with the much-improved VH control system. Fan-boosted heating is a welcome feature - it would have been false economy to omit it.

Understandably, the ute is not as quiet as the sedan: the readings we got under all conditions were about two decibels higher than those of the Regal, as the Rustler has more elementary soundproofing. At middle speeds it is fairly quiet, but sound becomes obtrusive at higher speeds, and we found we had to halfshout at cruising speed.

The low-geared steering means that a bit of wheelwork is needed in confined spaces and the turning circle is poor, but on the whole we found the Rustler quite easy-driving. Light-ride is firm without being too harsh, and it should smooth out under load.



though it will hang its tail about a bit if pushed in a hard corner. Nothing to worry about: the basic balance is sound, so correction is easy.

Summary

Chrysler has an attractive, no-nonsense ute of admirable quality in the new Rustler. With little design features like a well-raked rear window with a parcel shelf, the accent is on practicality and service.

With its fine team of strong engine, cooled transmission and robust suspension it should also be full of virtue as a towing vehicle besides its load-carrying merits.

This is a semi-luxury, well-equipped workhorse Valiant which must have strong appeal to farmers, commercial users and people wanting a leisure vehicle with superior all-round capabilities.




