

N W: It had rubbish heaped all over it. I think in the book it's known as a 1927 model.

INT: So how long was the restoration with the first one?

N W: Seven years. I had done a couple of runs because I used to drive one of Louie's cars (Ed: Keith Lucas). He's passed away many years ago [Ed: 20 May 2000]. He had three cars and I often used to drive one of his. Now Allan Martin has one of them. Now there's a whole other story as to what the Chrysler Club was to me. A lot of people know about it; everyone might know. I bought the car and I had it home and I stripped it right down to nothing and I was slowly working on it.

And then it was about 1995. I was at the club meeting (I used to go to every meeting) and I got a bit friendly with Dick (Hart) and Louie. Louie lived up at Tea Tree Gully, not far from my business and he told me that he had been to upholstery school and had upholstered the seats in his roadster - but his sewing machine was only a household one and he couldn't do his hood. I invited him to come to my factory the next day and have a look at the kind of work that we did, and if he liked, I would sew up his hood and side curtains for him. Louie liked what he saw.

I told him there was one problem. I'm leaving in a week, on a round the world holiday and I won't be back for a few months. Louie said he wanted to use the car in a rally, that was two weeks after my return.

So Dick and Louie turn up at work on my first day back. They had made all the hood bows, and they had the hood bows covered and the stuff down the side. And they had all the straps that go up and around to hold the hood bows in shape. They were well on the way. And that's what started me with Louie and Dick. They said why don't you bring your car up here (I had a lean to on the side of the factory) and we'll come and get stuck into your car. This started a real thing happening. We probably did about 20 cars; I don't know how many. Dick would drive his truck and two or three days a week, he would roll up at about 3 o'clock. Louie would come there and it ended up Rick Frith, Colin Frith, Graham Bailey, Bob Kay and Noel Cowie would be there a lot! Someone even had a sign written up on a plaque and pinned it up at the back; Chrysler Restorers Club, Ridgehaven division. That went on for years and years and years.



When I moved to the new factory, I put in a wall setting aside a 7m x 20m metre area with three roller doors and a pit. I think Louie helped design it. We built benches, Ron Hinks brought up a lathe, we had grinders and welders. We sort of had everything. Dick would bring his engine lifter up when we needed it. So soon my car got done!

INT: Just while we're talking about your car, tell me about doing the timber work in it. Who was the timber expert?

N W: Graham Bailey.

N W: He's a carpenter, and he's also worked on caravans and Louie wasn't bad. We glued marine ply together then we would start shaving it off because the doors would need to have a twist in them.

INT: Beautiful Yep and I see the


INT: Beautiful. Yep, and I see the process there. (*Photo page 11*)

N W: And you see those doors? We didn't have to worry about joints.

INT: Yeah, that's gorgeous.

N W: And the upholstery ...

INT: You knew a bloke that could



handle that. ©

N W: Yes, but we did everything. We made all new springs. We started from nothing. Any old ones we had, we just used them as a pattern.

For example with Allan Martin's car, we redid the seats, with special little springs to lower the front seat because Alan's really tall and they were made for little 4 foot 6 guys, I think. And so actually I've done all the upholstery in Allan's car, but not all at the same time.

INT: And who was your metal worker?

N W: Probably Rick (Frith), Dick and Graham Bailey can do a bit of that. Yeah, Rick was pretty good. Because that's what he did for a living. He also did the spraying.

I also did the big seats for the Highway Palace there. We also did the artificial tiles at the back of the Palace. Graham and I just lowered the saw a little bit and then every 3 inches or whatever it was we ran a cut part way through and then we'd go the other way. We also did a few other things for the Highway Palace.

We did a Chev for Bob Kaye, upholstery and wood. We did the upholstery for Ron Hinck's Whippet. Louie did another 1928 DeSoto. Yeah, so quite a lot of cars

ended up getting done there.

You see with me being at my job, I could come out and work for a few hours. If they sang out in the factory, I just walked through the door and I'd be gone. At Ridgehaven the boys had a key. So one weekend I had a went away with Joan and Dick went up there with Colin and put the motor in the '26. When I got back and I opened the door, the girls that worked for me had found an old petticoat in the rag bag and they pinned a sign on it, something about Petticoat Government, because I was away with my wife while they were working.

INT: That's a little unkind.

N W: When we did the Whippet for Ron Hinks, we put a big Greyhound on the side; Graham had worked for Greyhound coaches. We had a fishing rod with a tin of dog food an the front. We had a big muffler on the back and we put some Forward Look badges where the Whippet badges should have been.

In the new factory, Graham Bailey and I built a toilet which Gil Purdie plumbed for us.

We did some stuff on some of Gil's cars as well.

INT: So it was a very collegiate sort of thing. Everybody was helping everybody.

N W: It probably ended up overall about 20 guys did something there. Malcolm Dubois also come up sometimes. He used to do all our speedos and different things.

A lot of stuff was made. Ron Hinks and Bob Kay both had good lathes at home. Ron Hinks would spend hours making little boxes that you put casting sand in and I'd drop these off at the Wingfield foundry. He'd write what metal he wanted and what have you. And then I'd pick them up a few days later. Then Ron would put them on the lathe and clean and tidy them up; it was amazing. All the different stuff because you couldn't buy much.

And of course, we used to go to all the swap meets. We wouldn't have missed the Ballarat and Bendigo swap meets. We'd all pile in the car together and off we would go. We would stay in backpackers or whatever. Always looking for parts, searching everywhere.

INT: Wonderful. So as your business went on, you still kept Chrysler products as your daily drivers?

NW: Yes.

INT: Right up until Chrysler finished.

N W: Yes. The first Jeep I had, I kept for nearly 20 years, some of which was as a second car. Because during that time I bought a newer Jeep with a Mercedes motor and gearbox in it. I think I had that for about 10 years. And then, because I

wanted to tow a bigger van, I bought this one which I have had for 13 years. I haven't had any trouble with them.

INT: That's good to hear and. So your love affair with the Chrysler products has been maintained all the way along.

N W: Yes. Along the way I had the chance of getting a straight 8
DeSoto. I bought that off a bloke in Strathalbyn. He had it up for many thousands of dollars, and I'm not paying that. He had two. He had a roadster and a tourer. I think I offered him \$4,000 for both. He said no, and I left. Anyway, a couple of weeks later, he rings up and says his wife wants a new kitchen and I could have them both for \$4,000. He was actually a panel beater. So Louie went with me and we picked up both of them.

INT: Right.

N W: Graham Haggie nearly has the roadster on the road. I kept the tourer for parts.

N W: Joan would say to me, are you going to work today or are you going to play? I always told her the truth, of course ...

INT: Of course. So the Chrysler

Royal, where did you come by the Royal?

N W: Joan bought the Royal. She wanted wind up windows. Because if you wanted to put side curtains on, you have to stop the car, get out, and then put them on. Plus, it wasn't very comfortable in there. The Royal has been quite good, now that I've gotten a bit older. The others got a bit difficult to steer and to work on them.

INT: We're all here for comfort now.N W: So that's why I've still got that.INT: So, memorable trips with the club?

N W: Ah, I think that there's a lot more to come.

I was Father Christmas. I think I even drove him a couple of times and we went to one show and we had grandchildren by that time. Joan had some and I had some, so we were in the "kids zone" a bit, and Joan said I'd like to do that. I reckon I can make that a better show. So we spent a bit more money on it. I don't know what the club thought of it, but we did it. Initially it was something like half a dozen kids. We used to put the marquee up. We always bought chicken and everyone would bring salads and we'd

have tables under the marquee and we'd have it in different parks around the place. I'd have to go off and find a toilet or somewhere to put the suit on. At first the suit wasn't the best - but Carole Barnes made this beautiful suit. A good beard; that was much better. Later on, when we got the hall, I could go around to Chris Howes' and change.

INT: Yes.

N W: Joan would look all year for presents at markets and anywhere we went. It become quite a big job. We would sort of work on it all year. When we first had it, it was half a dozen kids. Later it was like 55 kids. They would come out of the woodwork! But it was grandkids. Everyone's getting older, and there's a lot of growing kids. I think that's sort of died off a bit, just at the moment.

I've made a few little kids cry, but overall it wasn't too bad. I was at one where one of the mothers asked Joan who Father Christmas was, because she didn't recognise me. When Joan told her, she came up with her baby for a photo.

At one of the events, a mother sat on my knee and the chair collapsed. From then on Chris brought a big wicker chair in his ute, one that would handle everyone. A bit of nonsense went on sometimes, but I enjoyed that while I did it. I also did pageants with Chris Howes and there was always 4 cars that went in it. We almost always did the Norwood pageant. I've done that for many years. That was enjoyable as well.

INT: Let's talk about some country trips. Memorable country trips.

N W: I have a lot of them. I think the first National Rally I did was to Wollongong. Louie by that time had his 54 or 56 DeSoto, I think. And he had a camper van, one that I had made. He towed that. So I slept in the camper van on the way over and back. His wife and Joan, flew to Canberra and we picked him up at the airport. Then we went from Canberra on to Wollongong. Have you been to Wollongong?

INT: No, never.

N W: It has the steepest hill you have ever bloody well seen. And if you miss the turn off, then you had to go right to the top before you could come back. One time that happened to me. Got up there, Dick was there. I asked what he was doing there and he said "Just come up for the view". I said "oh yeah!"

We had all had a bit of trouble with our cars. It was rotten hot weather, which wasn't expected at that time of the year. A guy who worked for Shell said that the service stations hadn't change from winter to summer formula. We had lots of rags around our carbies and some of the trips were fairly long running ones. But that was good, my first one.

I went on the committee for two of them. I was on the Committee for the one that was in Adelaide, down at

West Beach Caravan Park. So probably not as enjoyable when you're on the committee, because you're ...

INT: I know ...

N W: doing other things. That was a good one. The next one was the one the Beythiens ran at Renmark. We were on that committee. At that time we had a really big room upstairs, it was huge. That become rally planning headquarters.

We had all the rally bags and everything. We put all them together up there. The Beythiens would come over and we just worked through it, sometimes with other committee members. So I probably did more on that one than I did on the first rally. Of course, I was one of those who had been on a rally before, whereas a lot of the committee hadn't done a rally before. I enjoyed that one.

I went on quite a few of the. Federation Rallies. I enjoyed those. Went down the southeast. That was a good one. I don't know if anything spectacular happened down there, Noel had a breakdown in his Willys. It was a cog on his generator, which was made out of

leather. And it had little grooves in it. We thought, how do we make another one of these. The RAA guys helped, they took it all out and we went down to the local fodder store, where they sell horse rugs. And they said, Oh yeah, we've got a "leather man" out the back, but he's not here at the moment. I asked if we could use his tools? They agreed and we knocked up this leather cog and away he went. That was good.

I've got to try and think of what other ones we had. We went to various campouts. And we used to go to all the Kernewek Lowenders. Joan used to drive the Jeep with our caravan and I drove the '26 with three Golden Retrievers sitting in the back. They used to have a Cavalcade of Cars, a parade with about 1000 cars. We've done that many times, staying in the Moonta Caravan Park. That was always good.

INT: Yeah. OK.

N W: Wallaroo, Kadina and Moonta each had different things going on. We would usually go a day early and come back a day late, you know, make it a bit longer. We did have a big storm there one time, when they moved all the caravans up the top - except the Beythiens who stayed there. It was becoming 100 kph winds over the sea. They had their camper there, sideways in the wind, but they survived it. Yeah, they were good.

INT: Oh dear.

N W: Of course, a lot of the older members that we don't have any more, they would camp with us. We had lots of different camp outs. At

camp outs we used to put up the marquee.


We would get a couple of heaters if it was cold. We'd all go in there for our happy hour (that ended up three hours) and sit inside. If it was raining or something, you know, they used to be good. I think we must have been to Moonta with one of them too; up that way somewhere. Yeah, I think it was Moonta. Because we had a bit of windy weather up there too. We had an 18 by 12 marquee. But they have gone out of date now because people use these push up tents. With a marquee, you have to lay it out, put all pegs around ... Took half a day and lift it all up, and then you put your centre pole up last. It was quite a procedure.

INT: What comes through in talking with you, Neill, is I can hear the enjoyment in your voice when you're talking about the fellowship.

N W: Oh. Unbelievable.

INT: Yeah, it's a wonderful thing, isn't it?

17 August 2025






