Running Board Reflections

A few weeks ago, Linda and I returned from a two week vacation to England. We got a chance to visit with my cousin Kim and her family in Malvern, a small English town some 40 miles from the Welsh border. Malvern (Pronounced 'Mull-vern') is home to the famed British composer Edward Elgar, as well as the Morgan sports car factory. We travelled with Kim and her husband Chris to nearby Worcester and Hereford, where hurricanes hardly ever happen (think . . . My Fair Lady).

Back in London, Linda and I rented a car, and drove to the quaint country hamlet of Chawton, in Hampshire. This is where one of Linda's greatest literary heroes, Jane Austin, had lived. We toured her 18th century home and gardens, now a museum. Afterwards we made our way, on the left side of the road, to beautiful Winchester, where we visited their famed cathedral (I still haven't been able to get that song out of my head).

Upon our return to London, we arrived in time for the St. James Motor Spectacular. It is a magnificent car show on Pall Mall in the Westminster area of the English capital. The event showcased over a hundred incredible ancient cars, all built before 1905 (some dating as early as the late 1890's). Along with their proud owners, they are displayed for the public to admire the day before they are to drive the streets of London as well as the British public roads and highways south, some 60 miles to Brighton on the shores of the English Channel.

The famed London to Brighton Run is the world's longest running motoring event as well as the world's largest gathering of these veteran cars. Originally

called "the Emancipation Run," when it first started in 1896, it commemorated the recently passed "Locomotives on Highways Act," which had replaced the restrictive "Locomotive Acts" of 1861, 1865 and 1878. Before said act, vehicles were limited to a speed limit of 4 mph in the country and 2 mph in the cities, following behind a flagman walking ahead of the vehicle to warn the public of their approach. The new 1896 law allowed for a brisk, modern, some Victorians might even say "reckless" 14 mph speed limit!

The vehicles come from all over the world to attempt the 60 mile trudge from Hyde Park to the beaches of Brighton. 349 cars made it across the starting line just after dawn, that rainy November morning, with 330 of them finishing on the shores of the Channel. The United States was richly represented by several vehicles and their proud owners, having shipped their cars across the Atlantic for a chance to participate and forever enjoy the associated bragging rights.

There were five breakdowns just past the starting line, to my count. All but one recovered and sped off to glory. One fellow and his wife, both decked-out in 1890's fare (her hat with purple ostrich plume was devine) had to be towed off, having journeyed halfway around the globe just to participate. I approached him after the festivities had broken up. With most spectators having left, they were left to await the tow truck. Both he and his wife were all smiles. Genuine smiles.

"We made it over the starting line," he bragged loudly, and happy as a clam.
